DO YOU HAVE A MOBILE ZONE?

I find, perhaps like you, that I take my mobile phone everywhere with me. It is the essential ubiquitous, global, portable device. It is estimated by the Ericsson Mobility Report that by 2020, 90% of the world's population will have a mobile phone.

People continually use their mobiles for calls, emails and texts. We feel lost without our mobile phone, we become anxious when we can't find it, we get frustrated when there is no signal and irritated when it needs recharging!

HEAVEN: FROM PROTESTANTISM TO ORTHODOXY

Born in 1923 into a Church of England family I grew up in the 1930s in a firmly Protestant environment, in which there was sharp antipathy to anything which seemed to have even the slightest whiff of "catholic", not excluding personal piety.

The main services in my local parish church, and many others, were strongly Book of Common Prayer, sung matins plus hymns and sermon at 10.30 am, and similarly evensong at 6.30 pm. There was a said Holy Communion at eight am, but this was quite outside my experience until I was prepared for confirmation in 1938 at the age of fourteen.

When I returned from the war in the mid 1940s changes were developing, as gradually the Parish Communion at nine am became the main service, and sacramental religion came into my life. I had grown up with an understanding of heaven as some strange, distant, ethereal and uncertain place somewhere beyond the outermost reaches of space. It was a long time before I saw a new understanding of "... in Remembrance of Me", that remembrance was not the mental recalling of a past event but a present living reality, and God was not the superior, spiritual, moralistic (almost) "Father Christmas" figure I had imagined. Of course it was stated to be essential to believe in the Holy Trinity, but little insight into the supernatural was given and it remained remote, the preserve of the theologically educated...

My developing spirituality was driven on to the rocks with the publication of "Honest To God", a book written by a bishop of the Church of England in 1963, the burden of which is "our image of God must go, God is dead and to go on worshipping and believing as our forefathers is an obstacle to man's progress and development": naked humanism. As this spread throughout the church I lived the next thirty years struggling to remain faithful to what I had been taught, not least that the Church of England was one of three "branches" of the One, True, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church, alongside Rome and Orthodoxy, neither of whom, of course, subscribe to the "branch" theory of the Church. I found many obstacles in my path, but here I mention just a few, very briefly.

Distressed, I approached my parish priest, not long returned to the diocese (Blackburn) after some years on the staff of Canterbury Cathedral. He said to me, "Well, perhaps we should give a bit more thought to Christ's Divinity", and walked away.

In 1986 the Durham Affair caused a storm of controversy, when Canon David Jenkins was named as the next Bishop of Durham. He was an academic theologian with a considerable reputation, and traditional believers were outraged. For this purpose I simply quote one of his publicised beliefs, "There is nothing certain in the New Testament which is of any importance", in an attack on its historic events, particularly the Virgin Birth. All history is unreliable.

At a local deanery discussion group the clergyman taking part asserted, and not as devil's advocate, "Ah! But you must remember (!) that Christ could have been mistaken about himself, about Who He was". And so on and so on.

In 1993, six months after the vote in the General Synod in favour of ordaining women in the priesthood, following long years of strife in the Church, I encountered Fr Jonathan (Hemmings) and that is how I came to join the Pilgrimage to Orthodoxy, and two years later I was received into the Orthodox Church of Antioch. I learned Truth such as I had only glimpsed in the Church of England,

and especially that in the Divine Liturgy we are truly worshipping with the whole Body of Christ in the very courts of heaven. I was free of the individualism my prayers, my communion, my life, my understanding of truth, every man his own theologian - rife in the Protestant religion, and I became much more at ease, no longer in a defensive state of mind and spirit, in my God given individuality. Heaven is not somewhere "out there". I am persuaded that those who refuse to venerate the Mother of God (that truly would be a leap too far towards Rome!) are often found not to unshakably believe in the Incarnation and the real and actual bridge it gives between earth and heaven.

PILGRIMAGE TO ST. ETHELDREDA OF ELY

Dear Fr. Jonathan,

Belated congratulations to you and our community of the Holy Cross on the feast of the Holy Cross.

I wanted to share with you my joy of having the opportunity to venerate the relics of a remarkable British saint of the 7th century, <u>St Etheldreda</u> Abbess of Ely.

St. Etheldreda was a princess and could have anything a person could dream of in this life but chose to keep her virginity even being married twice. She negotiated that matter before her political marriages. Later she became a nun, an abbess and a founder of the Monastery of Ely on which she spent all her inheritance. 16 years after St Etheldreda's death her body was found uncorrupted. Very sadly, during Cromwell's attack on relics most of her body was destroyed. When it

happened, a Catholic man managed to hide only one of her hands. This hand is now exposed for veneration in a Roman Catholic church of St Etheldreda. Both Catholic and Orthodox Christians recognize her as a saint. The church that has the relics of St Etheldreda is a smaller church in Ely, not the famous large Cathedral (it was already built later during the Norman invasion) and is within a walking distance from the railway station in Ely. It makes sense to have a look at the website of this church, by clicking here, to check the opening times before the pilgrimage.

We are so privileged to have relics of a local saint within easy reach from Cambridge. It is only about 30 minutes by car or 15 minutes by train from us and there are regular trains to Ely from London. Such a comfort in our times! A bus to Ely even passes next to our house! I am attaching a photo taken during my pilgrimage.
